Readings

1 Timothy 1:1-14

Paul, an apostle of Christ Jesus by the command of God our Savior and of Christ Jesus our hope,

To Timothy my true son in the faith:

Grace, mercy and peace from God the Father and Christ Jesus our Lord.

As I urged you when I went into Macedonia, stay there in Ephesus so that you may command certain people not to teach false doctrines any longer or to devote themselves to myths and endless genealogies. Such things promote controversial speculations rather than advancing God's work—which is by faith. The goal of this command is love, which comes from a pure heart and a good conscience and a sincere faith. Some have departed from these and have turned to meaningless talk. They want to be teachers of the law, but they do not know what they are talking about or what they so confidently affirm.

We know that the law is good if one uses it properly. We also know that the law is made not for the righteous but for lawbreakers and rebels, the ungodly and sinful, the unholy and irreligious, for those who kill their fathers or mothers, for murderers, for the sexually immoral, for those practicing homosexuality, for slave traders and liars and perjurers—and for whatever else is contrary to the sound doctrine that conforms to the gospel concerning the glory of the blessed God, which he entrusted to me.

I thank Christ Jesus our Lord, who has given me strength, that he considered me trustworthy, appointing me to his service. Even though I was once a blasphemer and a persecutor and a violent man, I was shown mercy because I acted in ignorance and unbelief. The grace of our Lord was poured out on me abundantly, along with the faith and love that are in Christ Jesus.

Luke 10:1-12

After this the Lord appointed seventy-two others and sent them two by two ahead of him to every town and place where he was about to go. He told them, "The harvest is plentiful, but the workers are few. Ask the Lord of the harvest, therefore, to send out workers into his harvest field. Go! I am sending you out like lambs among wolves. Do not take a purse or bag or sandals; and do not greet anyone on the road.

"When you enter a house, first say, 'Peace to this house.' If someone who promotes peace is there, your peace will rest on them; if not, it will return to you. Stay there, eating and drinking whatever they give you, for the worker deserves his wages. Do not move around from house to house.

"When you enter a town and are welcomed, eat what is offered to you. Heal the sick who are there and tell them, 'The kingdom of God has come near to you.' But when you enter a town and are not welcomed, go into its streets and say, 'Even the dust of your town we wipe from our feet as a warning to you. Yet be sure of this: The kingdom of God has come near.' I tell you, it will be more bearable on that day for Sodom than for that town.

Book Review: Surprise the World by Michael Frost

Chapter Four - "Eat: The Second Habit"

In *Chapter Four of Surprise the World*, Michael Frost introduces eating together as the second missional habit. He argues that meals are not just social events but deeply spiritual practices that reflect the heart of the gospel. "Sharing meals together on a regular basis is one of the most sacred practices we can engage in as believers. Missional hospitality is a tremendous opportunity to extend the kingdom of God."

— Frost (2015, p. 47)

Frost draws on the life of Jesus, who consistently shared meals with people from all walks of life—tax collectors, sinners, friends, and even enemies. These meals were central to Jesus' mission of reconciliation and inclusion. Frost writes: "The table ought to be a primary symbol of the Christian gathering. It represents hospitality, inclusivity, generosity, and grace." — Frost (2015, p. 46)

A Table of Unity

Frost also connects this habit to Paul's teaching on the Eucharist in 1 Corinthians 11, where Paul confronts divisions at the Lord's Supper. Frost emphasizes that meals must reflect unity, equity, and care for others: "The habitual practice of the love-feast was to be an incubator in which Christians learned to accept the outsiders, offer generosity to the poor, and have fellowship with that so-called lower rank." — Frost (2015, p. 50)

Frost reminds us that this doesn't require elaborate dinners—it can be breakfast, coffee, or a simple snack. The point is to sit down with others and create space for conversation and connection: "Just sit across a table from three people this week, and ... talk." — Frost (2015, p. 47)

Mission in Everyday Life

Frost challenges believers to eat with three people each week, with at least one person outside their church. This makes mission relational, tangible, and integrated into everyday life. Shared meals become both:

Evangelism – Welcoming outsiders into God's family Discipleship – Deepening relationships in the Body of Christ

"Around a table, we are all equals." — Frost (2015, p. 54)

Meals slow us down, challenge individualism, and open space for storytelling, listening, and vulnerability.

A Note of Caution

One limitation is that Frost doesn't explore potential challenges—like building trust with strangers or finding time in busy schedules. But his call is clear and compelling:

"If every Christian family in the world simply offered hospitality around a meal once a week to neighbours, we would literally change the world by eating." — Frost (2015, p. 48)

Summary

Chapter Four shows that eating is a profoundly missional habit. Rooted in the example of Jesus and the teaching of Paul, Frost invites us to see ordinary meals as extraordinary spaces of grace, welcome, and transformation. "If every Christian family regularly invited a stranger or a poor person into their home for a meal once a week, we would literally change the world by eating." — Frost (2015, p. 48)


